Passive Park Committee formed to plan park in north end

SEAISLECITY Acommittee to get ideas from various community members was formed by Mayor Leonard Desiderto to move along the plan for the Passive Park in the north end where the former landfill was located around Fifth Street and Landis Avenue. The landfill was closed before the state mandated that closed landfills had to be capped, according to city engineer Andy Previti. That was good news for the committee with the biggest obstacle, the high cost of capping the landfill, eliminated.

Assisting the planning group is Gordon Dahl, who is executive director of the South Jersey Economic Development Commission, of which Desiderio is chairman. The group also agreed to contact state and county officials to assist in ne-

goriations with the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection in the design of the park.

The planning group listed the following activities and needs that they would like to see in the park: restrooms, parking, outdoor showers, bocce court canoeing, kayaking, osprey tower, bird watching pavilion, windmill demonstration shuffleboard, volleyball court and an environmental path.

The recommendation for a bake path that would not above the wetlands along the bay from 29th Street, after exiting the promenade to Fifth Street received the most enthusiasm. In addition, the group approved the idea of incorporating the proposed restored Ludiam Beach Lighthouse in the park concept.
